2025 RSA Regional Futures Conference

13-14 November 2025, The Cumberland Hotel, London, UK

As the world becomes increasingly interconnected it remains marked by persistent regional disparities. Regions are hubs of adaptation and mitigation strategies, especially in vulnerable areas, and regional studies must evolve to address the dynamic challenges and opportunities of our time. Complex issues such as climate change, migration, urbanisation, and socio-economic inequalities require multi-faceted approaches that transcend traditional disciplinary boundaries. Regional studies will increasingly need to collaborate with environmental, data and health scientists, while co-producing knowledge with policymakers, businesses, and communities will be key to ensuring relevance and impact. Allied with a stronger push to decolonise regional studies by incorporating indigenous perspectives and local knowledge systems into research and policy frameworks, these shifts are key to creating more equitable and context-sensitive approaches to regional development.

The Regional Studies Association Regional Futures Conference 2025 presents an important opportunity to champion a positive agenda for regional change and development. The event will provide an important platform to discuss and debate regional futures, establish new connections, and assess options for practitioners and policymakers working towards brighter regional futures.

The conference organisers are keen to attract papers and sessions which identify new connections, address broad research and policy agendas, and include contributions from any discipline offering insights at local and regional levels. Papers which are highly innovative, collaborative, international or multi-disciplinary are especially welcome.
